Enrollment information

Students may take classes from different undergraduate programs and make their own courses list for the exchange semester. Students are free to mix and match any courses from any undergraduate program. Many upper level courses (those numbered 3000 and 4000) may have pre-requisites, namely, a course (or its equivalent) or courses that a student is required to take before enrolling in that particular course.

Language requirements

If your native language or language of instruction is not English, we look for demonstrated English proficiency of: 79 TOEFL (IBT), 550 (PBT); 105 Duolingo English Test; or 5.5 overall IELTS. SAT or ACT examination scores are also accepted. The Morris ACT code is 2155, the SAT code is 6890, and the TOEFL code is 6890.

About the credits

All the courses at UMM have academic credits. Most of the courses have 2 or 4 US credits, and 1 UMM credit is generally equal to 2 ECTS credits. The number of the credits of each course can be seen in our <u>university catalog</u> or on the online class search tool, <u>Schedule Builder</u>.

- The number of classes typically taken per term: 3 or 4
- The number of hours per week typical student spends in class: 15
- Number of weeks per term: 16
- In each course, the academic criteria will be explained by each teacher at the beginning of the course and students will receive a syllabus of each course.



Application

- All students who have been nominated by the International Office from their home university, will need to <u>apply online</u>. The \$25 Application Fee is waived for international exchange students.
- 2. Official transcripts from Home University must be sent directly to the UMM Admissions office with a certified English translation if they are not originally written in English.
- 3. Submit official score reports for the TOEFL, IELTS, SAT, or ACT.
- 4. Complete the financial certification information. International students are required to certify their ability to pay for the cost of attendance at Morris by completing the online <u>Financial Certification form</u>. For Exchange students this would be finances to cover housing, meals, health insurance, books, and personal expenses.
- 5. Once admitted, the \$175 Confirmation Fee is waived. Exchange students are asked to email the Office of Admissions to confirm their enrollment.

Student Visa



U.S. Citizenship and Immigration Services (USCIS) regulates the student visa process in conjunction with the host institution. All students coming to the United States to study are required to secure the needed student visa.

After a student is admitted to UMM, the UMM International Student Programs (ISP) officials will issue the required document for the student to secure the required visa. This document for the F-1 student visa, the

Form I-20, "Certificate of Eligibility for Nonimmigrant Student Status," is sent to the student, who then arranges online the visa interview. <u>The visa process is outlined here</u>.

The ISP officials will assist with any questions through the process to obtain a student visa.

Campus Services

UMM's campus has much to offer to international students including cultural and sports activities. International students excel academically and enjoy a rich social life at Morris. International students are very involved in campus activities. A few examples are <u>Asian Student Association</u>, <u>athletics</u>, <u>dance ensemble</u>, and <u>choir</u>.
